




On the last day before Thanksgiving Break, our High School National Honor Society organized the filling of the Thanksgiving Baskets for our joint service project with Spring Hills Baptist Church. All of our high school students filled the 120 baskets that would be delivered to members of our community in need. Thank you so much for supporting those in need through this service opportunity! Thanksgiving baskets is an annual project for GCA that provides our students and families the opportunity to personally connect with those in need in our community. Our elementary students wrote individual notes to be put into each basket. They came down to the worship center by class where they prayed over the baskets and for the families who would receive them.













Mrs. Rizor and the art classes wrote Scripture around the rims of each basket and created artwork to be put into each one. This year, Pastor Gary took on the task of purchasing the rolls with the money donated by our senior class. As he was loading the rolls into his cart, a man approached him asking if he was a part of a church ministry for Thanksgiving. The man continued, saying that he had prayed for God to bring him an opportunity to help others in need for Thanksgiving. The man then paid for the entire cart of rolls and Pastor Gary was able to use the money raised by the seniors to purchase the remaining items that were still needed to fill the Thanksgiving baskets. It was a beautiful example of the way in which the Lord provides, whether it is for a physical need or a soul's desire to be a servant. We cannot thank you, the GCA community, enough for your donation of items to fill these baskets and greater needs of others for Thanksgiving.

Each year, GCA students in grades K-12 have the opportunity to help with Operation Christmas Child, a service project through Samaritan's Purse where shoeboxes are packed and shipped to countries across the world for the sole purpose of sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The national collection week took place in November where Spring Hills Baptist served as a local collection center for churches, schools, families and organizations throughout Licking County.

Our classes at GCA set their own goal to provide items to make boxes for a certain gender and age. After the items were brought in, Pastor Gary hosted a "Packing Party" with each class where the students were able to assemble the boxes themselves. They prayed over each box: for the children who will be receiving not only the gifts inside, but the message of Jesus's death and our salvation—that they may accept Him into their hearts as their Lord and Savior. The elementary classes hosted their packing parties right before Thanksgiving Break.

Every box has a divine appointment. We have had special Chapel speakers and guests over the years who were recipients of the shoeboxes in other countries and are now in ministry as missionaries and pastors. Operation Christmas Child partners with the local churches in each of those remote areas, and those local churches are the ones that personally deliver the boxes. As they do so, they share the Gospel with the children in their own villages. The most beautiful part is the relationship this builds between the children and the churches, opening the doors for those children to return to them over and over.

The middle school students helped load all of the completed boxes onto a semi truck that shipped them to Charlotte, North Carolina, the next day. Charlotte is one of six processing centers in the U.S. and it is the largest in both the size and in its production. Our Senior and Junior students anually make the trip to Charlotte to help process the shoeboxes with other volunteers during the first week of December, but, most unfortunately, due to COVID, this trip was not possible this year. Please be in prayer for the processing centers as they work through having significantly fewer volunteers this year.
