

During center rotations, each student is in charge of getting a Chromebook, taking it to the desk, and logging in to the Google Classroom to work on assignments. All students are able to navigate this without my assistance, which then allows me to meet with small groups of students for guided reading. The setup of Google Classroom has been one of the blessings taken from the days of remote learning. It allows me to individualize learning opportunities for students and also allows students to navigate independently through many different academic programs both at school and at home.

The Third Grade classroom is a busy place! The students in the classroom rotate through several classroom jobs each week. Students may have to clean lunch tables, inspect the room at the end of the day, monitor the charging of the computers. wipe down the white board, keep a list of prayer requests, or help clean student desks at the end of each day. However, three classroom jobs require work outside of the classroom. Our class Mathematician is in charge of filling an estimate jar. Once classmates make a guess on the number of items in the jar, it is the Mathematician's job to read the guesses and find the closest guess. Our class Reader picks a favorite picture book to read to the entire class at the end of the week. Fluency is one of the third grade reading standards, and listening to a classmate read a much-loved book is a wonderful way to help meet that standard!


Matthew 5:16 says: "In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

Math...the adventure continues in Mrs. Haga's classroom! We've been busy getting back into the swing of things this year by reviewing essential concepts such as integer operations in middle school math, evaluating expressions in Algebra I, and linear equations in Algebra II. Math 7 recently began Boot Camp: Decimal Fraction and Operation Training. It's like calisthenics for our math brains, training us for delving into our study of rational numbers. Preparing students for the ACT/SAT is one of our objectives for high school students, so students in Algebra I and Algebra II have also begun practicing the types of problems they may encounter on these college readiness and entrance exams.



English is off to a great start this year! We eagerly started reading the first set of novels. The sixth graders are reading <u>Anne of Green Gables</u> and are learning the strategy behind the program Membean, used to enhance their vocabulary skills. The seventh graders are reading <u>Across Five Aprils</u> and have already completed two grammar quizzes over manuscript form and capitalization. The eight graders are reading <u>The Red</u> <u>Badge of Courage</u> and have spent time discussing what courage means to them; after which many of them shared their writing pieces aloud in class. The freshmen are enjoying the novel Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austin, and many have perfected their British accents as we read together in class. We discussed pride and tied it into a Biblical talk that was very The juniors are reading engaging. The Great Gatsby, and began work in a new online grammar program called Egumpp. They also began writing their personal essays that will become part of their college entrance and scholarship applications. As we move through the year, we are encouraging all middle and high school students to keep up with their membean minutes by spending fifteen minutes of training for three days of the week. Each student has a full week to complete these forty-five minute sessions. Membean will greatly benefit them with their vocabulary and their writing overall!


On the first day of sixth-ninth grade science and sixth grade math, we started with some fun Mad Libs. We also made name tents so that I could learn their names, and on the backside, students helped me to get to know them by talking to me about their favorite things, asking a question, or just sharing a fun fact about themselves. This communication lasted for about a week and half with each day students answering questions I may have had or students giving another fact about themselves. As we dive into science and math content. I did a Checks lab with all the science classes on learning the nature of science. The students were in groups to observe paper checks and make conclusions and stories from what the checks displayed. Students working together helped them with their communication skills as they acted like scientists. Coming up next. students will learn science content, and we will be doing some demonstrations of concepts and some labs to reinforce the content. For math, students have learned about Order of Operations and Greatest Common Factors and will be learning about Least Common Multiples. One fun motivational activity was making a Venn diagram on the floor with string and students acting out the items that are placed in the Venn diagram.

The yearbook students are currently engaging in our annual Ad Sales Campaign. Our class of seven is actively reaching out to businesses in our community to ask for financial support through Advertisements. Each year, our yearbook staff has a goal to keep the price of the yearbook as low as possible for our GCA families. Students have been role plaving Ad Sales conversations, writing and proofing emails, and managing a list of businesses for which they are assigned. The Yearbook Staff gets to perform as if they are an office environment and work collaboratively and independently to accomplish their goal of selling \$500 worth of Ad space. Additionally, our students have started learning how to use the yearbook cameras, how to take quality photos. and the art of sorting and managing the pictures taken. Our eighth grade history class has begun a voyage: the journey of discovering and colonizing the New World (aka the USA)! Students are currently studying about the original thirteen colonies and are seeing how intended purpose and executed purposes may or may not have lined up when coming to the New World. Students have enjoyed seeing interaction between the Native Indians and the colonists and how they had to learn to live at peace with one another. They have also discovered how each of the original thirteen colonies were settled by different European nations and how each had a goal and purpose. We've briefly discussed and will expound upon the idea of creating a republic that ultimately evolves into the United States Constitution.

We are thankful our interactive TV arrived before we were ready to do our presentations. We spread this out over many weeks. We are incorporating real-life scenarios as much as possible and using students' own experiences to relate to the math topics. We have several more projects planned throughout the year. The students are utilizing Khan Academy to review and help prepare for their upcoming ACT. Each student has set a personal goal to improve their overall math scores.

HS English is in full swing. English 10 has already progressed through several units of grammar and writing. Students are currently learning how to craft proper outlines and are learning about the sentence in grammar. In literature, they are reading Silas Marner by George Elliott and discussing the themes of honesty and integrity while evaluating what things should be viewed as valuable. They have analyzed the author's style and written from the perspective of one of the characters. Learning vocabulary through our self-paced, individualized online, program called Membean continues this year for our MS and HS students. ACP English 11 is working through an advanced grammar review through a new online program called egumpp (English Grammar Usage Mechanics Punctuation Program). This program is designed to finalize grammar mastery, and students who achieve mastery will receive a certificate that they can include with their college applications. In literature, they are almost done reading The Scarlet Letter by Nathanial Hawthorne. Class discussions include

spiritual topics such as sin -- especially sinning by choice and the consequences associated; repentance --partial or full; forgiveness -- from God and from ourselves: and how our actions affect our testimony. Additional topics include relationships. boundaries. protecting our hearts, and not giving Satan a foothold, to name a few! Junior students are writing a personal essay that they will polish and have available for scholarship applications and for college entrance requirements. AP English began the year with a quick review of their summer work. They just completed the Mythology unit where they learned how Greek culture and its gods opened doors for people to more readily receive Christ and his gospel. They also learned about the hero's journey and how it appears in almost every story. Currently, they are studying about characterization as they begin to prepare for the three analytical essays they will write for the Exam in May. This small but mighty class is forging new ground in this revamped course.
